

## Paul Prescott's Hall of Fame Presentation

In 1989 Paul retired from the Air Force and moved to Lakeland, Florida. Because of his parents he had been playing shuffleboard on a part time basis for three or four years and was an expert in Ohio.

In the summer of 1989, Austin McDonald had resigned from the Central District as 3<sup>rd</sup> Vice President, so Harold Oren, the District President, ask Paul if he would take that position. So he was a District officer before he moved to Florida. At that time the 3<sup>rd</sup> Vice President took care of both the move-up points and the Reiny/Masters points. He did that for a couple of years and then moved up to 1<sup>st</sup> Vice because Wendell Lutes decided not to advance. It was Paul's suggestion and it was adopted, that they split the point recording between the 3<sup>rd</sup> Vice and 2<sup>nd</sup> Vice President. Skip McCoy asked if Paul would be his 1<sup>st</sup> Vice President of the FSA, so he resigned as District President after 2 weeks and became 1<sup>st</sup> Vice President of the FSA. In 1999 he moved up to President on the FSA and served for three years.

As a player Paul was a district amateur for one year and made instant pro in February of his State Amateur year, playing with Al Bocato at Trailer Estates, where they finished first. He went into the FSA Hall of Fame in 2002 as a player, having been inducted as a past president the year before. He had accumulated 117 points before the formation of the District Hall of Fame, so when he made the Hall of Fame he had 217 points.
